1980-2004

The 1980s and 1990s were challenging times for the HVCA and its members. The introduction and widespread use of desk-top computers changed almost every aspect of the business. Contracts became more onerous with increasing use of penalty clauses and guarantees, greater responsibilities and various forms of legislation relating to employment and to health and safety issues. Design became more specialised with emphasis on energy efficiency and consumption, system operation, planned preventive maintenance and cost-in-use. Installation techniques improved and committed on-site project teams became commonplace. Quality control was introduced. The benefits of off-site prefabrication were realised. Firms, recognising the needs for specialist commissioning teams and professional facilities maintenance, grasped business opportunities.

Back in 1961, the HVCA was a founder member of the Confederation of Associations of Specialist Engineering Contractors (CASEC). In 1992, CASEC was superseded by the formation of the Specialist Engineering Contractors' (SEC) Group, which has been involved in the implementation of Sir John Egan's Rethinking Construction and Achieving Excellence reports. The lobbying carried out by the HVCA, SEC Group and other bodies representing specialist contractors has resulted in a number of key recommendations, contained in Sir Michael Latham's landmark report Constructing the Team, achieving legislative underpinning. Following the formation of Amicus, a merger of the Manufacturing Science Finance (MSF) and the Amalgamated Electrical and Engineering Union (AEUU), the Major Projects Agreement was signed on 6 February 2003 by Amicus and the three m&e sector employer organisations (HVCA, ECA and SELECT). This represents the first agreement to cover both the mechanical and electrical contracting sector, and is designed "to change the culture of large m&e projects, to improve performance and productivity, to enhance industrial relations stability and to introduce integrated teamworking."

Now, in the 21st century, industry co-operation is being revitalised by initiatives such as supply chain management with clients, installers and suppliers working towards a common goal. The HVCA continues to expand its membership services through subsidiary organisations such as Building Services Training Ltd (Best), set up in 1990 and based in Slough, and by Piper Assessment Ltd, set up in 1999 in Swanley, Kent, as an accredited assessment centre.

The HVCA and the members it serves have come a long way in the last 100 years.






















