## FIREPLACES, STOVES & PEDESTALS



During the Victorian period, the potteries produced tiles which were used to decorate fireplaces, stoves and pedestals (cases around heating coils). Tiles were, of course, used mainly for bathrooms, kitchens and floors.










Fireplace designed by Digby Wyatt designed for the 1862 International Exhibition in London set with Maw's majolica tiles (Herbert & Huggins)




Cast-iron register grate with floral tiled cheeks, London, c.1880 (Calloway)
